PSEO OPTIONS

Crown is excited to offer Dual Enrollment and Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) to qualified OnWord students. PSEO is a Minnesota program that allows 11th and 12th-grade students to enroll in free college courses that earn them credits simultaneously for both their high school diploma and college degree.

Students take classes in a hybrid format in which Crown's online instructor partners with a Course Assistant from OnWord. The courses have a low student to instructor ratio. All students are supported by a dedicated Early College academic advisor.

SCHOLARSHIPS

A Crown PSEO Scholarship is available to students who attend Crown PSEO and then enroll as full-time first-year students the following academic year. The maximum amount of this scholarship is \$500 per year if attending on campus.

A Crown Christian High School Partner Grant of \$2,000 per year is available to students who enroll as full-time first-year students and who attended a partner Christian High School institution or a homeschool/PSEO Crown partner.

The Crown PSEO Scholarship and the Christian High School Partner Grant are renewable and stackable. Students must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress to renew their scholarship.

Students may also qualify for additional aid. Students must demonstrate financial need as determined by the FAFSA.

Students enrolling in an online degree program are eligible for a 25% off tuition discount.

- No standardized tests are required for admission
- The tuition and books are FREE for Minnesota students
- Tuition is \$95/credit for North Dakota students

ENG 1510 College Writing and Research (3 Cr)

This course emphasizes the fundamentals of effective writing in the context of the elements of rhetoric: writer, audience, and purpose. Students write narrative, informative, and persuasive compositions and a documented research paper.

IT 1060 Intro to Computer Applications (3 Cr)

A practical introduction to common computer software applications for workplace settings including programs for word processing, spreadsheets and presentation. Students learn through hands on activities and applied projects.

LAN 255 Spanish I (4 Cr)

This course introduces the student to the sounds, basic vocabulary, and structures of the Spanish language through listening, speaking, reading and writing, and beginning awareness of the cultural context of the language. Communicative skills are reinforced through practice in integrated laboratory activities.

MAT 131 College Algebra (3 Cr)

This course provides a short review of Algebra II, followed by a concise study of algebraic, polynomial, exponential and logarithmic functions and their graphs. Linear, quadratic and systems of equations are included, along with their applications. This course provides a foundation for students wishing to take calculus.

Prerequisite: High School Algebra II

MUS 1522 Class Voice Lessons (1 Cr)

This course will help students develop habits and skills that are appropriate for healthy vocal production. The course is designed for students with little or no vocal training who desire to develop their musical and vocal skills. Course content will include the fundamentals of speech and singing, the vocal process, vocal technique and how to learn and perform simple songs. Can be taken up to 3 times.

MUS 235X Music and the Arts (3 Cr)

This course introduces the student to music and the arts in Western Civilization. Chronologically based, the course deals with stylistic features, philosophical thought, composers, and artists and their representative works. (Also FAR 235X)

POL 2510 American Government (3 Cr)

This course examines the politics and processes of American government at the national, state and local level: the constitutional foundations of American government; national institutions, chiefly the presidency, Congress and Supreme Court; and the political forces that shape American government, including elections, parties and interest groups.

SOC 230 Sociology (3 Cr)

This is a survey course of the basic concepts in the sociological study of society, culture, the self, social organizations, the range of associational life, and social process

BUS 130 Concepts of Personal Finance (3 Cr)

A practical study of what Scripture says about financial stewardship, tithing, giving, investing, and the use of debt. Students will develop personal budgets and financial goals. Discussion will also include the use of various types of credit and insurance.

COM 1515 Intro to Public Communication (3 Cr)

This course provides the student with an introduction to the theory of the communication process. Topics include analyzing a target audience, organizing material, preparing an effective method of delivery, and developing informative and persuasive speeches. Each student will deliver speeches that are videotaped and evaluated.

FAR 1560 Art Appreciation (3 Cr)

An introductory study of art appreciation that examines significant art and artists associated with major art movements with a special emphasis on historic and contemporary art reflecting Christian beliefs. Content and knowledge emerge from the study of the elements and principles of art to acquire a vocabulary and understanding of the meaning and purpose of visual imagery and an overview of the development of art throughout history to the present.

HIS 2520: US History (3 Cr)

The course will examine political, social, economic, and international dimensions of the history of the United States. It aims to stimulate both an analytical and a moral understanding of critical issues from the nation's past.

LAN 256 Spanish II (4 Cr)

This builds on the work of Spanish I as an introduction to the sounds, vocabulary, and structures of the Spanish language through listening, speaking, reading and writing as well as awareness of the cultural context of the language. Communicative skills are reinforced through practice in integrated laboratory activities.

Prerequisite: LAN 255 or consent of the instructor

MAT 1410 Pre-Calculus (3 Cr)

This course covers concepts that are foundational for calculus. Topics include trigonometry, analytic geometry, probability, vectors, sequences and series. Students will also be introduced to the topic of limits.

Prerequisite: MAT 131

MUS 1522 Class Voice Lessons (1 Cr)

This course will help students develop habits and skills that are appropriate for healthy vocal production.
