## PSEO OPTIONS

Crown is excited to offer Post-Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) to qualified ACCS students. PSEO is a Minnesota program that allows 11th and 12th-grade students to enroll in college courses that earn them credits simultaneously for both their high school diploma and college degree at no cost.

At ACCS, students take classes in a hybrid format in which Crown's online instructors partner with teachers from ACCS to provide an in-person educational experience. These courses have a low student-to-instructor ratio and high success rate.

## SCHOLARSHIPS

Crown PSEO Scholarships are available to students who attend Crown PSEO and then enroll as full-time first-year students the following academic year. PSEO scholarship is \$1,000 per year, and students from ACCS are eligible to receive a Crown Christian High School Partner Grant of \$2,000 per year. Contact Admissions for more information.

The Crown PSEO Scholarship and the Christian High School Partner Grant are renewable and stackable. Students must maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress to renew their scholarship.

Students may also qualify for additional aid. Students must demonstrate financial need as determined by the FAFSA.

Students enrolling in an online degree program are eligible for a 25% off tuition discount.

**ENG 1510 (3 Cr) College Writing & Research (3 Cr)**

This course emphasizes the fundamentals of effective writing in the context of the elements of rhetoric: writer, audience, and purpose. Students write narrative, informative, and persuasive compositions and a documented research paper.

**HIS 231 American Civilization to 1877 (3 Cr)**

This course surveys the major themes and most significant events and people of American history from European contact through the Reconstruction of the Union after the Civil War. Particular attention goes to cultural and ethnic diversity, religion, constitutional development, and political issues

**MUS 235X Music and the Arts (3 Cr)**

This course introduces the student to music and the arts in Western Civilization. Chronologically based, the course deals with stylistic features, philosophical thought, composers, and artists and their representative works. (Also [FAR 235X](#)).

**BUS 130 Concepts of Personal Finance (3 Cr)**

A practical study of what Scripture says about financial stewardship, tithing, giving, investing, and the use of debt. Students will develop personal budgets and financial goals. Discussion will also include the use of various types of credit and insurance.

**ENG 1512 Introductory to Literary Analysis (3 Cr)**

Continued instruction and practice in writing and the writing process are the focal points of this course, with emphasis on critical analysis of literary genres.

**FAR 1560 Art Appreciation (3 Cr)**

An introductory study of art appreciation that examines significant art and artists associated with major art movements with a special emphasis on historic and contemporary art reflecting Christian beliefs. Content and knowledge emerge from the study of the elements and principles of art to acquire a vocabulary and understanding of the meaning and purpose of visual imagery and an overview of the development of art throughout history to the present.

**HIS 232 American Civilization Since 1877 (3 Cr)**

This course surveys the major themes and most significant events and people of American history from the late nineteenth to the early twenty-first centuries. Particular attention goes to cultural and ethnic diversity, political issues, economic development, and the United States as a world power.

**MAT 130 Mathematics Survey (3 Cr)**

A mathematics course designed for the liberal arts or general education purposes, including quantitative literacy and mathematical competency. The course consists of problem solving and mathematical modeling. Topics include set theory, operations, percent and decimals, linear equations and their applications, slopes, parallel and perpendicular lines, systems of equations, counting techniques, probability and descriptive statistics.
